What are the Hungry to do?

Every day there are people who live with hunger – a simple or profound need to eat but without good resources. Some of those folks are across the world in Africa or India or Europe. Some of those folks are in

Texas, or the upper Midwest, or in this Lake Phalen neighborhood. If you are hungry you seek out food in dumpsters, aid stations, at food shelves, or places where free food is served. If you are hungry you rely on the care and compassion of others to help you meet a basic requirement for life.

#### What are we to do?

Help the hungry!! It is our work as the people of God to provide care and compassion and help act to address hunger. And we are doing that well through various avenues at Our Redeemer. The national ELCA church was so grateful for our wider work around Hunger Ministry that they awarded us \$4,000 this year to help us continue this work. One thing we said in the grant we wrote for this money is that we would seek to engage as many of our active members in at least one means of Hunger engagement during the year. We will report back to them a number after the end of the year. Later this year we will have a bulletin insert form asking how you participated in our Hunger ministries and we expect to have over 90% participation. Please find at least one way to help with Hunger. Here are the Hunger ministries of Our Redeemer: **Dorothy Day** – we prepare and serve a meal every other month (4<sup>th</sup> Monday of even months) to about 275 people in more desperate conditions in downtown St Paul. People can help cook the food, come to serve

it, clean up or add to the Noisy Offering. Signups are always on the welcome desk.

**Loaves and Fishes Wednesday meal** – we serve a meal here at the church every Wednesday night from 5:30 -6:30 p.m. to 40—50 people. You can come eat and visit with the people or volunteer to help prep, serve or wash dishes. You can speak to Doreen Winter for more details – 775-3425.

**God's Work Our Hands Meal Pack event** – This fall on September 15 and 16 we will work together with many other faith communities and some area businesses to pack food with Meals From The Heart who then distribute these packets throughout MN, WI and SD. We aim to have 50-75 folks from Our Redeemer participate – go to stpaulsidebyside.org to sign up for a two hour shift or stop at the narthex table in the next weeks.

**Second Harvest** – We pack food about six times a year in the building that is located at Highway 36 and #61. Look for sign up sheets at the Welcome Desk this fall.

**Merrick Food Shelf** – We collect both cash donations (so they can buy food at much cheaper costs) as well as canned and boxed food items which get brought to the local food shelf located in Woodland Hills Church just behind the NW corner of White Bear and Larpenteur Avenues.

**ELCA World Hunger Appeal** – we collect the coin boxes but also receive other cash donations that get used for hunger relief throughout the world. The great thing about gifts given here is that 100% of the gift goes for direct aid.

Come Help with Hunger and make the world and our community a better place.

### From the Associate Minister

#### A word on young adults

It is no secret that the gap between young adults and Christian congregations is widening. There are many factors to this dynamic reality. Certain characteristics of today's young adults and their culture make them less inclined to seek out a congregation, or any institution. Certain characteristics of today's congregations make them less appealing to young adults. We do know young adults are not rejecting faith or religion. We do know many are

living out their faith in vibrant ways at innovative intersections such as: faith and political activism, faith and the arts, faith and environmental stewardship, and interfaith engagement. The Riverside Innovation Hub will help congregations become engaged with young adults at these intersections and at others we may discover along the way.

In March ORLC submitted an application and video applying to be part of a three-year initiative through the Riverside Innovation Hub. This summer, our congregation was formally accepted into the program. A few weeks ago, our team met and interviewed coaches. And now, we are excited to introduce our new coach through the Augsburg Riverside Innovation Hub program. He will be accompanying us for the next 10 months as we listen and grow into interpreting, discerning, and proclaiming our new story.

FALL BRINGS US BACK TO TWO WORSHIP SERVICES

#### **DOROTHY DAY NINE YEARS LATER**

In 2010 Pastoral Intern Chris Johnson encouraged ORLC to serve a meal at the St Paul Dorothy Day shelter. We weregoing to try for two months to see if we could get volunteers and funds to support this worthy cause. ORLC joined the Loaves and Fishes organization and began serving in June 2010. We serve on the fourth Monday on even numbered months. ORLC is now beginning its ninth year.

We have funded and purchased food that cost \$20,292.46 and served 13,250 meals. We have reached out to Thrivent Financial and received grants of \$4,250, thanks to ORLC Thrivent Members, and we have received generous support from congregants with our "Noisy Offering".

Amazingly 141 different people have volunteered to prepare and serve the meal. We depend on, and can't thank enough, our core group of about 20 people who come often.

We know there are many stories for the people who need a free meal. We have had volunteers say "that person used to live in my apartment building", "that person used to run around with my son in high school". Or the person volunteering may have needed help at one time. Even when shopping for food we have had store employees say they needed Dorothy Day at one time in their life. Many guests are homeless and many are stretching low incomes by receiving a free meal. Thank you to everyone at ORLC who has volunteered, contributed, made Thrivent Grants possible and to Thrivent Financial for their generous support.
