Living into our 2020 Goals

One of the most valuable things that churches or business can do is to keep focusing on the goals and directions that have been set to guide them. For us at Our Redeemer, we have seen and heard our *Mission Statement—Transforming Lives and Building Community by Loving God and Serving Others*—in worship, on our front wall, and inside of this newsletter consistently. We have also lifted up in various settings (annual meetings, newsletter, and ministry minutes) the *2020 Goals* that we are using to guide us from 2018-2020. Here is a chance to highlight one of those to remind us what we are trying to do, and to invite the wider congregation to try to own and live out some of these goals. You may know the old saying—*many hands make light work*—so let's see how we can lean into these as part of our faith life with Our Redeemer.

Our *Goal #5* states, “We will cultivate having 20 faith conversations per person.” Talking about our faith is not always easy, yet it is something we are called to do. And the invitation to do so can be good for us and good for others. We might follow the example of one person who is visiting with others on Sundays by simply asking, “Can you tell me a little bit about your faith life?” Another person has taken on the challenge of trying to have a conversation about faith with each person in their family.

I would like us to try living into this goal during the rest Lent as one of our spiritual disciplines. You could help at the Easter Egg Hunt and connect with visiting families by asking, “Welcome to Our Redeemer today - do you have a church home?” You might consider joining the neighborhood walk on April 7 when we will hand out fliers inviting people to worship with any of the three congregations worshipping at Our Redeemer. Or come on a Wednesday night for the community meal and talk with the guests about life and faith and perhaps talk about our weather. You could also use a family meal at Easter as an opportunity to visit with one other person and simply asking, “How does Easter make a difference in your daily life?”

The questions we ask and the conversations we seek to have can help us know more about another, and it can sometimes help us think about what we believe. This is a good discipline to try, and it is a fairly easy path to try. And often there are really good things to learn or hear. So I would encourage you to get out and give it a try starting with some simple questions. Easter blessings to all of you.

Rehumanizing the Marginalized

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie is a novelist and speaker from Nigeria. In 2009, she gave an influential presentation entitled, "The Power of a Single Story" on social media via Ted Talks. In her speech, Chimamanda shares how she discovered her own authentic cultural voice. In the process of discovery, she realized that if she only relied on a single narrative to give her information about a specific group of people, she would not have a true and full understanding of who and what that person was about. Her point is that each person is a compilation of stories, lived history, and shared experiences. If you only look at one side of a person, you miss out on the richness of that life and take away their humanity.

Let me give you an example. I recently watched the movie "Green Book" starring Mahershala Ali and Viggo Mortensen. Set in 1962, Mahershala Ali's character, Dr. Don Shirley is an African-American classically-trained musician touring the deep south with Viggo Mortensen's character, Tony Lip, serving as chauffeur. At one point in the movie, Tony Lip, who incidentally is white, is casually conversing with Dr. Shirley about what he thinks African-American culture is all about. Tony assumed all African-Americans ate fried chicken, worked blue-collar jobs, and listened to Little Richard. Dr. Shirley helps him to realize that a single story does not give the full picture. A person is much more complex than a single story.

When we reduce people to a single story, we dehumanize them. Jesus spends much of his time teaching about the marginalized populations in his time. The poor, widows, orphans, disabled, diseased – both physically and mentally, those who were ridiculed and chastised by society. Jesus worked to rehumanize these dehumanized populations. His parables condemn those who were too busy in their own lives and too hardened of heart to care for others in need. Jesus expected people to change how they behaved, spoke and even thought in regards to others. Jesus worked to change hearts and minds, to rehumanize those marginalized communities.




SUNDAY, MARCH 31 is SHARED WORSHIP and POTLUCK and SPREADING THE NEWS!

A STEWARDSHIP INSIGHT FROM LUTHER SEMINARY - STRATEGIC GIVING FOR RETIREES

Most retirees live on a combination of Social Security income and distributions from their retirement accounts, such as IRAs (Individual Retirement Accounts). It may surprise you that many retirees don't need all the money in their IRAs, but they are forced to take distributions when they are six months past turning 70 years old. These distributions are commonly referred to as RMDs (Required Minimum Distributions) and are virtually 100% taxable. Until recently, people had no choice but to withdraw these (sometimes large) RMDs and pay the corresponding tax. That extra income often causes additional expenses, such as:

- Increasing someone's overall tax rate
- Increasing the amount of Social Security Income that is taxed
- Increasing the cost of Medicare premiums

Today, people have a choice. If they don't need or want those sizeable RMDs, they can send some or all of it to their favorite charities and avoid those uninvited costs mentioned above. This technique is called a "**Qualified Charitable Distribution**" (QCD) and it's becoming *extremely* popular. Here are some of the finer points of a QCD:

- Must be 70 ½ or older at the time of the transfer.
- Counts towards satisfying RMD.
- Distribution is not taxable to IRA owner or to charity.
- Must be sent *directly* from IRA custodian to charity.
- Only applies to IRAs—*NOT* 401(k), 403(b), etc.

The Qualified Charitable Distribution is probably the most tax-efficient way for retirees over 70 ½ to give to charity. They can use it to tithe, or to make significant contributions for any charitable purpose, easily sending a check.
